Elmhurst, Illinois, located 17 miles due west of Chicago, is a residential suburban community with a population of approximately 45,500. Elmhurst District 205's boundaries also include some households from Addison, Bensenville and Oak Brook. Elmhurst College, a four-year liberal arts college, is also located within the District's boundaries.

THE FRESHMAN MENTOR PROGRAM

student with The Freshman Mentor designation on his/her transcript is one of the leaders in York's Freshman Mentor Program. The Freshman Mentor Program offers upperclassmen the opportunity to be part of a comprehensive transition program for freshmen at York. Upperclassmen who are interested in becoming a mentor go through a rigorous application process, with only the most qualified students being accepted into the program. Once admitted, the mentors participate in a training that focuses on leadership and communication techniques and sign an agreement to abide by the York Code of Conduct. The mentors play an active role in the Freshman Orientation Program, as they work with freshman students once a week throughout the first semester of school.

SCHOOL YEAR

The school year consists of four quarters, each nine weeks long. The academic day is divided into eight 50-minute periods; classes meet five days a week. The first semester ends December 21, 2018, and graduation will be held on May 19, 2019.

SCHOOL

York Community High School, established in 1917 and accredited since 1925, is a distinguished four-year comprehensive high school. Located on a 45-acre campus, York currently has an enrollment of 2,816 students. The Class of 2018 graduated 685 students including foreign exchange students and students continuing on to the Transition Center. 94 percent of whom matriculated to degree granting institutions. Over 78 percent of students participate in one or more extracurricular activities. In addition to College Preparatory course work, York also offers several unique Career-Focused Programs of Distinction:

- Tech Services Internship Students support 1:1 Chromebook Initiative
- Food and Restaurant Management -Students run a working restaurant
- Medical Careers Students participate in 'rounds' at local hospital
- Invitation to Teach Students are daily interns in K-8 classrooms
- Automotive Repair Students manage a working garage
- Child Development Students run a community preschool
- Architectural and Engineering CAD -Studentsdesign and create 3-D models

MATH/WORLD LANGUAGE 9TH GRADE PLACEMENT

Because District 205 is a unit district, students have the opportunity to complete beginning levels of foreign language and mathematics prior to beginning at York High School, District 205 students who successfully complete Algebra 1, Geometry, French 1 or Spanish 1 and who demonstrate proficiency on our high school placement exams are enrolled in Geometry, Algebra 2, French 2 or Spanish 2 respectively. No high school credit is awarded for courses completed at the middle school level.

DUAL COLLEGE CREDIT

York and Indiana University have formed a dual credit partnership called The Advanced College Project (ACP). ACP provides York students college level coursework while in high school. With successful completion of an ACP course, a student receives both high school credit as well as credit for the identical course at Indiana University. Courses include Composition 101, Literature 101, Rhetoric 101, Sociology Honors ACP, French 3H ACP, French 4H ACP, Spanish 3H ACP, Spanish 4H ACP, Italian 3H ACP, AP Italian ACP, Calculus 2, Calculus 3 & Functions and Finite Math ACP.

York students who successfully complete the following York High School courses will earn Dual Credit with the College of DuPage: Principles of Physics Technology (full year course), Technical Drafting/CAD (full year course), Food & Restaurant Management (full year course), Invitation To Teach (full year course), Heritage Spanish II Honors (full year course), Architectural Drafting/CAD (semester course), Business Management Honors (semester course), Personal Finance Honors (semester course), Technical Writing Honors (semester course), 2D Design (semester course), and Computer Concepts and Skills (semester course).

GRADE POINT AVERAGES

For the cumulative grade point average, all courses are assigned full point values, with the exception of P.E., structured study halls and aide positions. Students may take one non-required course each semester on a pass/fail basis.

For a single semester, GPA is figured by adding the point total (non-weighted) and then dividing by the number of classes. For each honors class with a grade of A, B or C, .20 is added to the GPA.

Grade Point Values:

A = 4 points B = 3 points C = 2 points D = 1 point F = 0

When calculating GPA for multiple semesters, the honors weight of .20 is multiplied by the total number of honors credits that are C or above, and then divided by the number of semesters the student has been in school. The resulting fraction is then added to the cumulative unweighted GPA. This new weighted GPA is used for determining honor roll and only this GPA is shown on the transcript.
